

Poems always flow out of a poet's life gracing it, marking time and clarifying important transitions. These poems track the opening of the lotus of being, the shade is extended, celebrating the clear beauty of life, a light in darkness, both of which are salient, neither of which shall be denied—that done with grace—that done because

doing it is true.

There is a field of wisdom these poems have been filtered through, growing as they have along with the wisdom itself. As a result of her work as an editor and educator, Flowers has become a Mythologist. She has always been a poet. These beings converge in Extending the Shade both in the way individual poems are created—like myths, using metaphor to point to transcendent principles and in the way the parts of the book are arranged: The Journey, The Garden and The Solid Light. It is impossible not to see in Flowers' poetry the influence of Joseph Campbell's work. It is equally impossible not to see in the presentation of The Power of Myth the hand of the poet. "I think of the poems in the book as moments of a myth that continues to develop and that myth is the story of my life. A poem is a moment in myth. The difference between a story and a myth is that a story occurs in time and a myth is composed of timeless moments that are poems."
